
PLATTERS **PLATTERS** MIKE OGLESBY DEMO The December demonstration presented by Mike

Oglesby was a comprehensive and in-depth look at turning platters. Mike has obviously thought out the elements of woodturning, and he instructs us on these fundamentals.

Thermodynamics, a branch of physics concerned with heat and temperature and their relation to energy and work figures greatly in Mike's business, metal work, no less for woodturning when the iron meets the wood. Lathe speed increases heat via friction every time a tool is applied to the work piece. Mike explained how to deal with this heat.

Keep tools sharp. Apply the tool in the right position so that the cut is small and controlled. "Heat," Mike told us, "is reduced as material is removed. This is just as important for a pocket knife as it is for a power saw and everything in between."

Mike insists that every time the bowl gouge is applied to cross grain work, it be in the closed position to prevent a backskip. Each time the tool is established, then the tool can be opened to finish the cut.

The piece presented Randy with numerous challenges with stabilizing it prior to turning. The stem, lid and finial are made with cocobolo and spalted hackberry.
