Due to Bryce Ellis, our scheduled demonstrator, being called out of town, Jim Bob Burgoon filled in as the February demonstration. Burgoon utilized the same drive system he used during his December demonstration of turning pens between centers to create one shop aid, a fan pull, and a two-for-one doorstop. The drive center he utilized was a metal lathe dead center. The live center in the tailstock was a 60° cone. Both centers are carbide tipped. In his December demonstration, he listed his source for centers as zlivecenter.com. The first project Jim Bob turned was one featured in AMERICAN WOODTURNER, Journal of the American Association of Woodturners August 2015 edition. Jim Duxbury's article "Shopmade Burning-Wire Tool" utilized guitar strings as the wire for burning decorative lines in turnings. Burgoon turned 2 handles and assembled the tool in short order. He demonstrated using one of his previous burning tools to add decorative lines to the handles before he removed them from the lathe. One point Burgoon stressed was how valuable the resources provided by AAW are. Past journals can be downloaded by any member of AAW and the website is a great information source. Next, Jim Bob mounted an antler segment between centers. While roughing it down, he mentioned this was a valuable technique he utilizes when making antler pens. Straightening the blank up prior to drilling, aids in preventing the bit from blowing out the side of the antler while drilling. Once the blank was trued, he proceeded to shape a fan pull from the antler. Sanding to 1200 grit




